Salisbury Cathedral

Flower Festival 2022

Planning for the 2022 flower festival at Salisbury Cathedral is well underway

'Celebration' A Festival of Flowers takes place from Tuesday 10th to Sunday 15th May and will involve hundreds of arrangers.

It is designed by Michael Bowyer, Pam Lewis and Angela Turner, all Chelsea gold medallists.

Michael, director of Salisbury Cathedral Flowers and president of the



National Association of Flower Arrangement Societies (NAFAS), said everyone was saddened when the festival planned for 2020 could not go ahead due to the pandemic.

But, he said, next year's festival will include

elements of the cancelled festival as well as themes celebrating the Queen's platinum jubilee, key workers, the power of nature, the cathedral's treasures and the Church's year.

"As well as members of Salisbury Cathedral Flowers, every flower club and every church from the Diocese of Salisbury has been invited to take part," said Michael.

He added that the festival would be environmentally friendly, as arrangers would be using compostable substitutes for floral foam, and a section of the displays would focus on bees and other pollinators.





Corsley Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Parish Clerk, John Willcox, rounds up the PC's activity in December

The Parish Council met in the Reading Rooms on 6th December. The meeting was attended by our County Councillor, Mr Bill Parks.

The meeting was chaired by the current Vice Chair, Dr Neil Carpenter and the first item of business was the election of a Chair. this post being vacant since the resignation of Mike Butler. Neil Carpenter was elected Chair and David Ball was elected Vice Chair.

Mr Parks advised that the Council had recently published material relating to the Queens Platinum Jubilee, which he had noticed was on the agenda for this meeting (the meeting subsequently agreed to defer this item and pick it up in January.) He also spoke about the ash dieback survey that the Council is undertaking, the Council have engaged Wessex Rural Crafts to inspect along A and B roads, but for all other routes the expectation is that Parish Councils will be doing this (by the way, there is no budget for this or for the felling of any trees affected!)

Co-option

Wiltshire Council had advised that there was not a requirement to have an election to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation. It was agreed that the Parish Council would seek a co-optee to fill the vacancy and would follow the same procedure as adopted previously. Details would be published in The Bridge, put on the village Facebook page and notice boards around the village (see notice elsewhere in this edition for details.).

Following further discussion it was also

agreed that, beginning in January, the PC would meet every two months and would trial starting meetings at 7 pm rather than 7.30 pm.

Planning Applications

It was reported that the planning application for the further development of the Baytree Close site - PL/2021/07575 - had been withdrawn. It is understood that a revised application will be submitted in due course.

There were two planning applications that were considered:

PL/2021/10341. Dye House Farm, variation of a previous application to allow the introduction of fish to the wildlife pond. The PC had no objection to this application.

PL/2021/05441. 1 Heathway, Amended plans to a proposed extension had been submitted.

The PC had no objections and repeated their previous observations regarding this application regarding the implementation of the national planning policy relating to light and privacy.

Streetscene

David Ball, the PC rep for streetscene reported that he would be attending a meeting, to be chaired by our MP, Dr Andrew Murrison, along with officers and members of Wiltshire Council, representatives of Chapmanslade and Maiden Bradley parish councils and the Maiden Bradley Weight Watchers Group. The subject of the meeting

is the increasingly vexatious problem of overweight lorry traffic through the villages. The discussions with Wiltshire Council regarding the speed limit review through the village are ongoing.

Equine Road Safety and Rights of Way

Lavinia Mitchell took the meeting through the main issues affecting equine road safety in rural areas such as ours. There were several actions which would make the village safer for horses, riders and pedestrians which the council will look to take forward. In addition, the British Horse Society, who are actively working to improve road safety with their 'Dead Slow' campaign, have offered guidance and will also support the initiatives with the provision of training, signage and other materials

Lavinia also reported on some problems that riders have with access issues on local bridleways. She drew attention to the importance of off-road routes, to protecting our historical rights of way, and making sure that they are available and in good order for everyone to continue to use and enjoy.

Finance

The deadline set by Wiltshire Council for details of the precept claimed by the Parish Council is 18th January 2022. The precept is the amount that the PC needs to fund its duties and responsibilities and is raised by Wiltshire Council via Council tax. The PC sets its budget each year, usually in December. It should be noted that Corsley has a lower precept than other local villages despite being made up of a number of hamlets leading to significantly greater road lengths.

At the meeting it was agreed to defer this task to January when it was hoped that we would have more certainty regarding some significant cost elements, both those falling in the current financial year and those which should be budgeted for in the following financial year. Additionally it was felt that

the Parish should be aware of areas where significant expenditure may fall in order that feedback can be obtained;

Kissing gates

Many in the parish are in various states of disrepair and need replacing. Should they be replaced like for like or should they be replaced with metal ones? (It is known that many of the gates were 'donated' by organisations and individuals in the village, it would be useful if any donees could advise on their views on replacement by contacting the Parish Clerk)

Village gates at either end of the village

• Speed indicator signs

Again these have been shown to slow traffic in other villages.

- Contributions to Wiltshire road safety initiatives eg road signage and road markings.
- Equine Safety measures Signage and training

• Verge cutting

Parishioners will have noticed that there has been a reduction in the frequency of verge cutting by the local authority. This has lead to many complaints and the PC have considered 'doing their own thing'.

The PC agreed that they would continue to make grants/donations to village organisations. Details of the criteria and how and when to apply will be confirmed early in the new year.

Once again, the PC would welcome input from residents as to how they feel we should be using the precept in supporting the village.

Dear Friends,

I wonder how you feel about the short, dark days of December and January? For some it's an opportunity to enjoy the longer evenings, engaging in some sort of craft, to settle down by an inviting fire, feeling the warmth and comfort – maybe with a good book. For others the dark nights are far too long, and they would really value some company, it is good to keep an eye out for those who might be struggling.

There is however something quite special about the dark, because there are lights that can been seen much more clearly, candle light glows brighter and stars twinkle brightly for example. In the New Testament (the second collection of books in the Bible) at the beginning of the Good News (Gospel) according to John the Apostle it says "In Him (God – specifically the Word) was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. Creation of development groups for our two churches in Corsley and Chapmanslade

The Corsley and Chapmanslade Parochial Church Council are creating development groups for each of our two parish churches, to begin a process of public discussion and decision making into their future use and to secure their survival. These groups will begin their work on 1st April this year.

The decisions made should have a positive impact on our communities as a whole in both villages, so all interested parties are invited to play a part in deciding how changes to the churches could provide additional facilities with benefits to all.

It is expected that the terms of reference for each group will include:

- 1 Plans to bring the churches up to good condition.
- 2 Ideas for changes of use to include wider community activities
- 3 A plan for building development to meet item 2.
- 4 Financial planning and grant applications to permit building and ongoing running costs.
- 5 Undertake public and statutory consultation to meet local authority planning, Historic England, interested parties and church regulation requirements.

Detailed terms of reference will be the first task of each group.

Discussions will be held with all village organisations during January and these will be encouraged to be represented in the development process.

Walking through lockdown

Corton Flood Plain Walk



For this walk, I parked in the lay-by outside the entrance to the Dove Inn at Corton, on the back road from Warminster to Salisbury. If the lay-by's full, I ask to park at the Dove Inn and that's where I have lunch; it's a winwin situation!

You'll need wellies here at any time of year - and a drink may be handy, as this can be a ninety-minute stroll or a two-hour trek! Be warned that the fields you're going through are sometimes filled with cows...

Walk the lane at the left of the Dove Inn (Coomb View), down the hill and round at the bottom, with Weston Nurseries on the left of the right-handed bend. On your right should be Corton's playing field, while on the left you'll pass the Fane Village Hall. Round the next bend left, you'll pass a house on the left with a mural high on the brick wall, of a Saracen on horseback; I wonder if this building was once a pub?

When the road bends right, go into the dead-end lane straight ahead. The bungalow on the right here is a 1919 extension to the 1828 chapel further along the lane. Pass that and the lane becomes a tractor-width track. Ahead of you is a railway bridge to pass under and you'll see the track resembles a ford.

Keep walking ahead. The track eventually turns left on a bend, but go ahead, on to the single-width muddy path that rounds a lefthanded bend and then goes straight ahead of







you. You'll reach a pair of metal kissing gates; go through both and keep walking. Ahead of you should be another metal kissing gate and, when you're through that, go ahead and slightly right, through another metal kissing gate. You should now be on a bendy bit of single-width mud path to yet another metal kissing gate. If you don't like cows, check this field and the next one are clear of livestock before you enter, if possible.

Otherwise, cross the first field and there's a metal kissing gate at the start of a tarmac bridge, and another one at the bridge's end, which leads into a second field. Follow the trodden-down grass track across this field until you reach – yes, you've guessed it! – a metal kissing gate. Go through it, cross the wooden bridge and you're in the hamlet of Knook. Follow the tarmacked road ahead of you, passing a substantial house on your right, which may once have been the rectory or vicarage for little Knook church behind it.

At the crossroads, turn right and walk carefully through the farmyard. At its end you'll see a five-bar metal gate, with a gap beside it for walking through. Next, ahead of you, is another five-bar gate to the footpath. It isn't locked; go through that and walk across the field, through a metal kissing gate and over a bridge. Keep walking on the tarmac road,

past different buildings until you reach the Prince Leopold pub at Upton Lovell. Beyond the pub there's a triangle of grass and a tree on the right, with a dead-end road beside it, which leads, eventually, to a footbridge. Cross that and go through yet another metal kissing gate. Check for cows here!

Cross this field, walking straight ahead, until you can see a five-bar metal gate ahead of you, then find the kissing gate to the left before it and go through that. You're now on a hard narrow path which leads to the railway and this time, you need to climb the yellow metal steps, cross the tracks and descend the steps at the other side. DO be careful here! The hard path you're on now bends right and takes you out to a tarmacked lane. Hooray, you're back in Corton at last!

Turn left and stay on this lane, not turning off. You'll pass various buildings including a former derelict church and a cottage with a well outside, both on your right. When you pass the Dairy House on your left at a righthand bend, you'll see designated road parking for the Dove Inn on the right. Round the next bend right, your car should come into view, if you left it in the lay-by near the pub. The Dove Inn opens at noon and I recommend a bowl of their cheesy chips, after a hike that's probably near four miles long!

Chapmanslade Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Councillor Colin Bell reports on the PC's latest activities

Chapmanslade Parish Council (PC) met on 9th December 2021 in the village hall. Councillor Phil Holihead Chaired the meeting at which there were five councillors and two members of the public. As always, at the start of the meeting councillors were invited to declare and record any conflicts of interest.

Update on Barters Farm construction traffic

It was agreed that a recent PC letter sent to Newland Homes, the developer at Barters Farm, expressing concern over construction traffic travelling through the village from the Frome direction (as opposed to direct off the A36, which was pledged during the original planning consultation process), would be sent to relevant Wiltshire Council Planning Officers for their attention/intervention.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)

As reported previously, relating to the Barters Farm Development, the first tranche of CIL monies has been received. For the benefit of parishioners and residents, and drawing on previous community consultation, the PC is working on the process by which it can determine how best to utilise these funds. The PC will continue to liaise with Wiltshire Council to establish the required protocol for project identification and awards. Once this is established, the PC will publish details on the PC website, In addition, the PC will invite parishioners and residents to review,

comment and ask relevant questions as part of transparent and open dialogue. Further discussion regarding CIL is tabled for the PC meeting on 13th January 2022.

Planning Applications

PL/2021/10085 - Listed building consent (Alt/Ext) Conversion of existing farm outbuilding to create single residential dwelling and proposed extension on western elevation (Thoulstone Farm)

The PC agreed to check with Wiltshire Council Planning Officers that this planning application did not include any changes to building structure or size between planning application and listed building application. Based on Local Planning Authority, the PC has no objection to the Thoulstone Farm listed building application.

PL/2021/10341 - Removal/variation of conditions. Variation of condition 2 of 19/01106/FUL to allow the introduction of fish to the wildlife pond (Dye House Farm, Corsley)

No objections were raised on this application.

PL/2021/10796 - Householder planning permission. Proposed carport with study over (2 The Old Orchard, High Street, Chapmanslade)

No objections were raised on this application.

20/06919/OUT - Outline planning application for five serviced self-build plots, with all matters reserved except for access (Land to the north east of 150 High Street, Chapmanslade)

The PC continues to object to this outline planning application. The PC's objections remain as per the formal objection, which have been previously submitted to Wiltshire Council. This objection is based on a number of factors including the site being outside of the village settlement boundary, significant concerns relating to highway safety and the potential negative impact on biodiversity and sustainability.

PL/2021/11047 - Householder planning permission. Single storey rear extension with two storey side and rear extension (138 High Street, Chapmanslade)

No objections were raised on this application

Inspectorate Reference: APP/ Y3940/W/20/3258466; Planning Appeal: 19/11575/FUL - Change of use of land to create a traveller site, day rooms and associated works.

The PC agreed to continue to object to this Appeal. This decision was based on a number of factors including previously recorded significant highway safety concerns raised by Highways England and the proposed development being in a designated Special Landscape Area.

Finance

The prudent financial management of the PC budget was reviewed and discussed. This included a review of expenditure to date, consideration and agreement of planned payments, which included a donation to the church and to the village hall. The outcome is that the forecasted spend for the financial year 2020/21 is within the received precept of f,5,850. The 2021/22 budget was discussed

and the precept was agreed, with a 3.01% uplift on the present year. For the benefit of parishioners, the 2021/22 PC income will increase by £566.

Recognition, appreciation and thank you

The PC took the opportunity to formally recognise, appreciate and express their gratitude and thanks to the range of voluntary community groups that commit their time, energy and expertise for the benefit of parishioners, residents and visitors to the village. These include all members of the village hall committee, the group of volunteers who have coordinated the procurement and installation of the new outdoor table tennis table, outdoor gym equipment and bench on the Parish Memorial Playing Field, those active on the COVID Action Group and many, many more. Thank you!

All her plant materials come from her garden and walks in the local countryside (lock up your hydrangeas!), with just a few bought in from local growers. Hers is a very busy life between the family farm, the family, wreathmaking workshops and, of course, making wreaths and decorations for Christmas!

Kit's chosen charity (to which her fee was donated) was the Wylye Valley Disabled Children's Charity, which provides outdoor experiences such as camping and riding for those who otherwise might not be able to access such facilities.

We watched, fascinated, as Kit rapidly constructed an evergreen wreath Christmas wreath, talking us through all the different stages and offering lots of tips on how to make a professional end-product. There was plenty of discussion on techniques, especially "quarters" and "thirds"; with the various pros and cons of modern and traditional methods being debated by those more au fait with floristry terms.

At the end of her demonstration, Kit (ably assisted by Alice) auctioned off the wreath she'd just made, along with the samples she'd brought along. The meeting decided that the monies raised (£,45) should also go to Kit's chosen charity.

As part of the meeting, Maggie Wobey had brought along a craft stall; all the items were made by herself with woodwork by her husband, Derrick. They are raising money to start a nursery at the Temple Cloud School, for which they are governors. With a super range of gifts for young and old, they raised £,75!

There was also the usual table for Christmas cards, to which Eve added those 'little brown envelopes' for everyone's 2022 subs; due by the end of March.



Memories of Corsley School

Winds in the willows

David Ball recalls his tenure as Headteacher at Corsley School...

It was one week till half term and a Friday in October. The children all loved Fridays, for that was swimming day! At 1 o'clock, directly after lunch, the whole school clambered aboard the Beeline coach and set off for the swimming pool at the Kingdown Sports Centre. Boo Hardy and I took our classes there each week - she supervised the girls changing and her class in the pool and I supervised the boys changing and the more confident learners in the pool. A qualified swimming coach took the children who could swim and taught them the various strokes and how to improve their techniques and our aim was that every child would be able to swim before they left us for secondary school.

The day had started much like any other, the usual lessons in the morning, the children went out to play as normal at break but, after their lunch, they were a little more excitable than usual; Boo and I put that down to the windy weather and the fast approaching half term holiday. Lining the children up on the playground at 1pm to get on the coach, we both kept our fingers crossed that the threatening rain clouds would pass over without a downpour!

As we walked into the sports centre the wind was becoming a bit stronger, but it was calm and warm in the pool and although we could see the leaves swirling in the windy gusts outside, Boo and I taught the children as usual, got them dressed and lined them up

ready to return to school. As we led them out to get back onto the coach and emerged from the shelter of the building, we discovered that the wind was much stronger and many of the smaller children were struggling to reach the coach. We all climbed aboard and set off for school but it was to be a longer journey than usual! As we reached the Picket Post roundabout we discovered that all the traffic was turning back - a tree had been blown over and was blocking the A362 and our route back to school. There then followed a long detour back to school via Chapmanslade, which was exciting for the children but Boo and I were worried we wouldn't be back in time for the end of the school day and the parents would be waiting. We arrived just a minute or two late, so all the children who were going home on the coach stayed on board and the others were taken by their waiting parents at the gate.

Boo and I went into the main building for a well-earned cup of tea, but on the way a parent suggested I have a look at the roof on the front of the building. I unlocked the front door and stepped outside, just in time to see a slate slide off the roof and embed itself vertically in the front lawn - a quick glance showed three other slates had also embedded themselves in the grass. I hastily stepped back inside and locked the door, grateful that only the occasional visitor ever entered the school that way!

It was October 16th 1987 and the Great Storm had well and truly made its mark in Corsley! Several trees had come down and many had damaged roofs, greenhouses and sheds. Longleat lost hundreds of its magnificent beech trees - it was one of them which had forced our lengthy detour!

We had got off lightly. 18 people were killed

by the storm, an estimated 15 million trees had been lost, large parts of the country had no power, wind speeds of up to 86mph were recorded and all trains were cancelled as the worst storm since 1703 wreaked havoc in many parts of the country, but our children enjoyed their swimming session!

Corsley Parish Council

Co-option to fill a vacancy on the Parish Council

Electors in Corsley Parish will be aware that a vacancy has arisen on the Parish Council following the resignation of a Parish Councillor.

Wiltshire Council has advised that there is no need for an election to fill the vacancy and the Parish Council has agreed that it will seek to fill the vacancy by co-option.

Candidates should be registered electors in the parish area, or if during the whole 12 months before co-option they have owned or been a tenant of any land or premises in the parish, or if their principal or only place of work has been in the parish, or if they have resided in the parish or within 4.8 km of it. Candidates should also be over 18 at the time of co-option, should not be bankrupt and have not been in prison in the last five years.

Candidates who are interested in cooption should apply, by email or post, to the Parish Clerk, John Willcox. Candidates should attach a covering letter detailing relevant experience and some explanation of why they wish to join the Parish Council. The closing date for applications is Sunday 9th January 2022.

Prospective candidates are welcome to contact the Clerk or Neil Britten or Judith Helliar, both of whom were members of the Parish Council for a number of years for an informal discussion about the responsibilities and time commitments involved.



A view from over the hedge...

Countryside Matters

Thankfully, we had a dry autumn and higher than average temperatures for the last few months, for which we ought to be grateful!

The first signs of spring in the countryside will be those little white snowdrops popping up in lanes, bridle paths and verges. The willows will start to bud and the hazel will produce its dangly catkins (known by country children as lambs tails).

The hoar frosts will change your day with its shear beauty of whitening the branches of trees, the hedgerows and all the surfaces it touches. My favourite are the fragile cobwebs just hanging with that delicate dusting of fine white frost.

Ground frosts are welcomed by farmers and gardeners alike as they break down the heavy soil making it easier to work when the seeds are sown.

The dairy herd is enjoying the warmth of the big barns, some are on straw bedding and others on thick rubber matting. It was a great relief that in November all our cattle were tested for bovine tuberculosis (TB) and, except for a handful of false negatives which will be re-tested in February, we are now free of TB in our herd and can now sell our cattle on the open market.

Some of the young stock will live outside most of the winter grazing on roots, kale and silage which was strategically placed in the fields last autumn.

Large ring feeders are moved onto the bagged silage daily so that when the wrapping is removed the cattle can help themselves, and there is little wastage.

All the water troughs have to be checked daily to see that they have access to water 24 hours a day. All the other water tanks are turned off during the winter so that we have no leaking pipes after freezing weather.

In January and February we batten down everything so whatever the weather the animals and staff are safe.

Already some of our sheep farmers will have their sheep indoors ready for lambing, but for those kept outside the food is scarce and sometimes you will find heavily pregnant sheep sheltering under hedges. Please make sure your dogs are on leads as the sheep are easily frightened and lambs will be aborted.

In some areas, old hedges are being laid by professional hedge layers (Prince Charles is an ardent advocate of this). It is a costly project for farmers and landowners and, sadly, a dying craft, it would be good to see some of our young farmers encouraged to learn the

There's a host of good reasons for hedges being maintained; they act as shelter from prevailing wind and rain, they create cover for nesting birds, and produce berries and nuts for food for all kinds of wildlife. They are also a lifeline for the movement of mammals such as hedgehogs. For farmers and land owners they are a secure way of keeping animals safe within their boundaries. The removal of hedges, whether farm or garden, means the loss of natural habitat for so many creatures.

I do hope the next few months you will all keep safe and healthy and be able to look forward to better times ahead.


