

Science: changing the world

Coronovavirus

Should we be worried?

It is early days, so what can we say today?

All my working life I have been producing scientific papers, knowing that there could be discoveries between writing and publication that may change my conclusions. That is how science works. This article is the same. I am

writing about the new coronavirus at least two weeks before you read this. Information will change and I may have to provide an update in a future article.

Coronaviruses form a class of respiratory viruses that is estimated to cause up to a third of all colds. However, some cause more severe pneumonia-

like symptoms, such as the previous outbreaks of SARS (Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome) and MERS (Middle East Respiratory Syndrome) viruses, which caused a number of deaths. The new coronavirus, identified in December 2019, was originally called 2019-nCoV but may be renamed as it is thought to be related to the SARS virus. This is mainly of interest to microbiologists and doctors concerned about how these viruses rapidly evolve, sometimes to be more easily transmitted or to cause a more

severe, higher-fatality disease.

Of more general interest is knowing how dangerous the new virus is and what we can do to avoid it!

The virus was originally thought to be caught from animals - both bats and pangolins have separately been implicated

> by various groups, but the main danger is human-to-human transmission. This virus appears to spread more rapidly than other coronaviruses. On

18th February there were 73.336 confirmed cases of the new coronavirus disease (known as COVID-19) around the world, 72,438 of which were in China.

There were 1.874 deaths and 13.049 recovered individuals at the

same date. The World Health Organisation has called a global emergency as it is still has called a global emergency as it is still unclear whether this will give rise to a pandemic. One estimate is that failure to halt the virus could infect 60% of the world's population and result in 50 million deaths.

This would be most serious in poor countries, where health systems are struggling, but it was recently claimed that 50% of UK individuals could become infected. However, such scary figures have no basis in fact as yet. They are worst-case estimates.

So how serious is COVID-19? Currently deaths occur in 2.6% of confirmed infected individuals – these are mainly elderly patients. For comparison, MERS had 34% deaths and SARS had 9.5%. Flu, for which nearly half the UK population is offered the vaccine, had a death rate of .13% of diagnosed cases in 2018-19. The major difference is that COVID-19 virus spreads very quickly in a human population. A vaccine may take 18 months to develop.

What can we do to minimise the risk?

At a national level, infected individuals are being isolated and those at risk of infection from contacts are being advised to isolate themselves. Goods from China are not considered a risk.

What can we do at a personal level?

Most obviously, try and minimise contact with anyone coughing and showing flu-like symptoms. Avoid touching communal surfaces with your bare hands (I wear gloves on public transport and try not to use handrails in the flu season). Wash your hands frequently or

use an alcohol-based hand sanitiser. Minimise hand-to-mouth contact, which may transfer a virus from surfaces to the respiratory tract; we may unconsciously do this about 15 times an hour. Wearing a facemask does little to help as they are ill-fitting and become moist inside, allowing other germs to breed, and they can be a hazard when discarded. Hospital staff follow strict protocols with their facemasks. If you come down with pneumonia-like symptoms, isolate yourself and phone for medical advice. The "catch it, bin it, kill it" advice for flu also applies to coronavirus.

Given the number of cases in the UK, flu is currently a more serious problem than COVID-19 in my view. However, this may change. It is still early in the outbreak and microbiologists and medical professionals around the world are on high alert.

Chapmanslade **History Group**

Searching for the old and the new...

These last few months have been particularly busy for the Chapmanslade History Group, which until very recently has been led by Joyce Jefferson. Since 2013, Joyce had been the inspiration and fountain of historical knowledge behind all the hard work that the group put into publishing a brand new book, 'A History of Chapmanslade', which was launched at the Three Horseshoes over the weekend of 18-19 October 2019. Since then, over 320 copies have been sold. Thanks to everyone who has bought the book and supported the group.

This brand new local history book tells the story of Chapmanslade through the ages, from prehistory up to near present day. It has over 100 pages and 120 photos. Group member David Gafney produced numerous maps especially for the book. The photo, taken at the book launch, shows Ben Levegue, General Manager at the Three Horseshoes with Joyce Jefferson.

Chapmanslade has been a complicated parish to research for the group, as it only became a parish in its own right in 1934, having been created from parts of Dilton Marsh, Corsley and Upton Scudamore. The group needed to look at the history of all three parishes before the history of Chapmanslade



could be understood. On the other hand villagers have been extremely generous in sharing their treasured family photos, stories and local knowledge.

On the 14th January, 22 people attended the group's annual lunch – of course at the Three Horseshoes. This was Joyce's official Leaving-Do, following her and husband Phil's move to Tetbury. Joyce was presented with several 'thank you' gifts and Dennis Barnard said a few words of farewell.

The group have continued unabated into 2020 having decided to research various

properties in the village using original deeds where possible, then potentially try to use that information together with other material to help produce a historical guide when walking through Chapmanslade. So if vou have any deeds or information about your house that you would like

Campanology News

No doubt those of you who can hear the bells have noticed that they have been ringing rather more than usual during the last month. We have been practicing hard for two competitions; Rounds Competition for novice ringers and 6 Bell Striking Competition for more experienced ringers.

I have been teaching now for four years and three years ago we entered a novice team consisting of two of my learners supported by four slightly more experienced ringers and they won! They then went on to win the Salisbury Guild Trophy. As far as I know it is many years since our tower has entered the striking competition.

Ringing is judged to be perfect when a constant rhythm is achieved with an equal gap between each sound of a bell. This is extremely difficult to manage over the four or five minutes the performance takes and for most it is impossible but we will do our best.

The competitions are marked by two judges sitting outside and remote from the church. They therefore do not know which

tower is ringing and have the amazing ability to hear even the slightest fault during the performance.

The Rounds Competition is handicapped. Competitors who have rung for under two or five years deduct faults from the total and those who have rung for over five years add faults to the total. Four of my learners are ringing with two members who have recently joined. The Striking Competition is not handicapped and simply marked on the standard of ringing. Wish us all luck!

Parish Council Briefing

Chairman, Neil Britten, rounds up the PC's activities

There has been one meeting since the last edition of The Bridge, an occasional, on 20th Ianuary, to consider one planning application and take routine reports and consider ongoing matters.

The PC also met as Trustees of the Len White Fund to consider one grant application and the Fund's future. In the context of the latter, the PC is grateful for the four letters which have been received concerning the winding up of the Fund. It should be noted that Trust meetings are not public, but the general outcome of the considerations relating to the Fund's future is reported below.

At moment, Wiltshire is beset by a 'mega' IT collapse and the planning website is not available for new inputs. There is one Corsley planning application waiting in the wings (20/00391/FUL - access to a paddock at Cranfield, Lane End), but no papers yet posted, and a decision is overdue on the Corsley House bund. The PC is in direct contact with Wiltshire on the latter.

Planning application

19/11626/FUL - Construction of new vehicular access and parking/turning area to serve residential dwelling: Deerleap Cottage, 112 The Hollow, Corsley

The PC agreed no objection to this application subject to a fence/hedge being established along the edge of the drive and the parking hammerhead, to delineate between

the residential curtilage and the agricultural

Replacement of bus stop shelters

The PC is very aware of the poor material state of the bus stop shelter at the Heath. Temporary repairs have been made after one of the roof supports collapsed and the PC is very grateful for the work that Graham Watts did, in foul weather at very short notice, earlier in the year. The PC is now taking steps to find a suitable replacement for this shelter, to be funded from the precept.

The intention is to replace the shelter with a structure which is durable, functional, but rather more in keeping with the village setting than the current austere structure. The new wooden shelters at Beckington have been inspected, as potential models, but it is felt that, whilst they are an appropriate and attractive style, an all wooden structure would not have the required life or resistance to vandalism. Neither is a modern perspex/ metal frame design considered to be desirable.

It was agreed that a 'rustic' design was appropriate and that it would be sensible to approach a local builder for proposals. The search is on and any contribution from bus stop shelter 'afficionados' would be gratefully received by Gill Parkinson and Steve Meyer who are leading the charge.

Annual Parish Meeting

Elsewhere in this Bridge is a notice confirming the Annual Parish Meeting for 6.30pm,

Monday 16th March, in the Reading Room. The speakers will be; from Longleat, Jon Timney, Director Estates and Maintenance and Simon Townsend Operations Director; from the Reading Room Management Trustees, Chairman Hugh Deed who will explain the challenges faced by the Trustees and options for the way ahead. As also indicated on the notice, as Chairman, I always prepare a report and am perfectly ready to deliver it and answer questions afterwards. However, in the past few years the room has generally emptied when the meeting gets to this point - if you have read all the briefings in The Bridge briefs! The PC looks forward to a full attendance. Reminder notices will be posted at the usual key points around the village.

Len White Fund

The PC, as Trustees of this Charity, met on 20th January to consider bids and the future of the Fund. One bid had been received, plus several suggestions on how to dispose of the Fund's capital should the funds available for grants be exhausted. In the event, the one application received did not met the Trust Deed's criteria and the possibility of Fund closure was no longer an issue. However, it seemed evident that, despite regular advertisments in The Bridge, there was no longer any demand from the village for qualifying grants. Recognising this situation, the Trustees made three decisions.

First, it is clear from the Trust Deed that bids for grants do not have to arise solely from external applicants. The Trustees themselves are equally able to propose schemes, provided that they are strictly in accordance with the Trust terms, ie "...for the benefit children of Corsley between the ages of 5 and 11 for educational purposes as the full Parish Council shall think fit." Several putative schemes were discussed in line with the decision that the Trustees might generate their own ideas, and all those which had been

offered from the village.

Second, before making any firms decision to take this route, the Trust should be advertised more widely in the village and, to that end, it is hoped that a regular slot on The Bridge website can be arranged.

Third, no grant making decisions on either Trust generated schemes, or external bids, would be taken for six months after the additional advertising was in place.

Seven Open Doors

Dear Friends,

Are you watching the signs?

I don't think I have ever known such grey days as we have been experiencing this winter, so it has been with some delight to see the signs of Spring. The snow drops in profusion, defying all sorts of weather, delicate and gentle in their appearance yet hardy and persistent in their flourishing, followed by vibrant yellow trumpeting daffodils and carpets of bluebells, all signalling the arrival of warmer, lighter days.

Another favourite of mine is the Hellebore, also known as the Lenten Rose and so named because the sepals and flowers arrive around the time of Lent, and have a rose like appearance, although they are actually related to the buttercup. They come in many varieties with purple or violet being a common colour – very fitting for reminding us of the season! Purple or violet reflect the tone of the season in Church hangings and vestments and symbolise for us a time of penitence and preparation. The word Lent comes from the Latin for lengthen and refers to the lengthening of days, and more daylight hours (hooray!). Traditionally, it has been a time for the preparation of candidates for baptism on Easter Day, rising from the waters of baptism just as Jesus rose from the tomb, the first fruits of a new creation. Self- examination was very much a part of that preparation and what it means for us all to choose to 'turn towards the light of Christ'.

Even if we were baptised long ago the need for self-examination continues, the choice to turn away from darkness (a euphemism for that which is not of God) and turn towards the light can and should be part of our faith walk with Christ on a daily basis. In the forty day booklet produced by the Church of England, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York write....

'Lent is a time for reflection. Before the solemnity of Good Friday and the glory of the resurrection on Easter Day, Christians have the opportunity to remember Christ's withdrawal into the desert for forty days. It is a time to re- evaluate, a moment where we can turn away from the luxuries and distractions of daily life and face God. In so doing we face light, love and life. Facing God makes Lent a time for renewal.'

I wonder what discipline you have chosen to aid this time of reflection, a fast perhaps – a time of cutting something out that has become a distraction between you and your faith journey or maybe it is doing something extra like following the 40 day booklet of meditations and actions, or both!

Those who are reading the Lent book 'Say Yes to Life' will meet with Pauline at the Rectory on Thursday March 5th at 2pm in an introductory session and meet again in Holy Week on Thursday 9th April to share their reflections on caring for creation. Whatever you have decided upon to prepare, I pray you will have a good and holy Lent, and that the signs of God's glory in creation will cause you to stop and wonder at the beauty and gift that is all around us.



Changes to your recycling

The way in which recyclable materials are collected from the kerbside will change and we will soon be contacting you about how this service will change

The good news is that residents will be able to place more materials in the blue lidded bin.

Many households will also see their collection day change as we will be making the collection routes more efficient, so there will be fewer collection vehicles on the road. This will help to further reduce the council's impact on the environment as part of its pledge to become carbon neutral by 2030.

Letters are being sent to every household in Wiltshire to inform them of their new collection day. Once residents have received their letters they can go online and check their collection day and print off a bespoke collection calendar at www.wiltshire.gov. uk/rubbish-and-recycling

Residents will receive a leaflet with the letter containing more information about the changes, as well as a sticker explaining which materials can be placed in the blue lidded bin.

The changes are also being communicated to residents via the media, social media, roadside banners at household recycling centres and other key locations, posters and pull-up banners in council buildings, leisure centres and libraries.

In summary, the new service is:

- In the blue lidded bin you can place cans, tins, aerosols, paper, cardboard, cartons, foil, plastic bottles, pots, tubs and trays
- In the black box you can place glass bottles and jars and bagged, dry textiles
- The blue lidded bins and black boxes will be

emptied fortnightly on the same day, using new recycling collection vehicles.

There will be no change to the household waste collection service or the chargeable garden waste collection service. Your collection days for these services will remain the same.

The service changes will take place over a four-week period from 24 February to 20 March. We are asking every household to look out for a letter that will tell them the date of their last black box and blue lidded bin collection under the current system and the date of their first collection under the new system. Once they have received their letters, people can also visit our website to find out when their next recycling collection day will be under the new arrangements. Residents who know of any neighbours who don't have access to the internet could check whether they need someone to download a calendar for them. Alternatively, residents can telephone the council on 0300 456 0102 to ask that we print a calendar and post it to them.

When residents receive their last collection under the current system, an information hanger will be attached to their blue lidded bin telling them that the service is changing. They should receive the letter with details of their new collection day soon after.

Collection crews will complete the final collections under the current system from 24 February to 6 March, attaching the

information hangers to the blue lidded bins telling residents that their collection service is changing during this time. The first collections based on the new system will take place from 9 March to 20 March.

The collection day changes will improve the efficiency of our rounds and reduce the number of collection vehicles on our roads. Because the vehicle rounds are changing it is important that residents put their bins and boxes out by 7am, as the times of their collections may change.

Recycling tips:

- Wash and squash all cans, tins, plastic and cartons where possible.
- · Bottles, jars, cans, cartons and aerosols should be empty; lids can be left on.
- Flatten cardboard boxes to make more room in your bin.

It is important to wash cans, tins, plastic bottles, pots, tubs and trays and cartons before placing them in the blue lidded bin so there is no food or drink that could contaminate other materials such as paper and cardboard. This also reduces the risk of any odour. Residents should not place excess cardboard next to the bin as if it becomes wet due to rain it will not be collected.

If residents think they may not have enough room in their blue lidded bin, we are asking them to try to squash and flatten as much of their recycling as possible for the first few collections to see if this is a suitable solution. Larger or additional blue lidded bins will not be delivered until residents have first tried the new service and demonstrated to themselves that, despite squashing and flattening materials, they need the additional capacity. They can then request a larger or additional blue lidded bin via the Wiltshire Council website.

Plastic film, black plastic and plastic flower pots of any colour should not be placed in the blue lidded bin. Plastic film and black plastic should be put in the bin for non-recyclable

waste, but plastic flower pots can be taken to your local household recycling centre for recycling. The council is only able to recycle plastic bottles, pots, tubs and travs collected at the kerbside.

Where residents have clothes or shoes that someone else may be able to wear, we are asking them to continue to take these to charity shops. Any other textiles for recycling should be clean and dry, placed in a bag and tied. The council will not collect duvets, sleeping bags or single shoes.

A new materials recovery facility designed to sort the recyclable materials collected from the blue lidded bin has been built near Calne. This should enable the materials to be sorted to a high quality standard for delivery to reprocessors for recycling. For more information about where materials collected for recycling are sent for reprocessing, please check the council's website: www.wiltshire.gov. uk/what-happens-to-recycling

By making it easier for people to sort their waste, we hope to increase the amount of waste we recycle. In 2018/19 the council recycled 42.69% of the household waste that it collected from the kerbside and at household recycling centres. 89% of the household waste the council collected for recycling, composting and re-use in 2018/19 was managed within the UK.

In response to Wiltshire Council's acknowledgement of the climate emergency, the Green Pledge promoted by the council asks people to recycle as much as they can, as this will also help reduce our carbon impact. The new kerbside recycling services are designed to increase public participation in the kerbside recycling services provided by the council so should help the council to become carbon neutral by 2030. 



Chapmanslade Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

John Foster reports on the meeting held on the 13th February

Thirteen members of the public were in attendance, which was chaired by John Lewis, our Vice-Chair. Four Parish Councillors were present.

Open Session

In Open Session a variety of topics were raised concerning planning, the Wiltshire Planning website and littering within and around the extremities of the village. The majority of attendees raised concerns about the lateness of the notification of Planning Application for land on the south west side of Black Dog Hill, Chapmanslade - the lack of proven essential need for it and the systematic inaccuracies within the application. In parallel, all noted the very significant risk associated with caravans joining and exiting the A36 in what has already proven to be a fatal accident area.

Concerns were also raised on the Thoulstone Farm Swimming pool planning application both in terms of the environmental impact of the indoor pools as well as to the Grade 2 Listed building's environ.

Other planning issues were raised about the change of use application for the tractor shed on land along Huntenhull Lane and the planning appeal at the Ganders site, which is situated on the land to the rear of the village hall. In both cases, members of the public expressed concern that planning rules were being manipulated to achieve the

construction/approval of residential buildings in areas where such building should not be permitted.

The Closed Session meeting then addressed the following:

Telephone Box

The BT Phone Box would remain in place as BT had decided not to remove it at this time. It is expected that a further review is likely to occur in four years.

Planning applications

Application number 19/11065 Thoulstone Farm swimming pool.

The decision of the council was to object. The concerns raised related to the excessive height of the building above the listed walled garden and impact on the Grade 2 listed farmhouse building. A potential further risk to drivers on the A36 was identified from the sun on the glass roof causing dazzle. Councillors also questioned whether the swimming pool building could be sunk lower into the ground leaving the roof of the building less visible.

Application number 19/11575/FUL Land on the south west side of Black Dog Hill, Change of use of Land.

The council strongly objected to this application due to Highway Safety especially given fatal traffic incidents in recent times. Concerns were also raised at the

lateness of application notification and the significant number of errors/omissions and inconsistencies within it.

Application number 19/11906/FUL Huntenhull Farm, Change of use of tractor shed to holiday cottage and regularise existing access track

The council agreed to strongly object to this application for a number of reasons primarily that the application for the tractor shed within the SLA was originally granted permission in 2012 /13 based on agricultural need, despite it being a retrospective application. Had the original application been for a residential property it would have been refused as

there was no essential need and it sat within the SLA. Secondary issues associated with increasing the traffic risk near an extremely difficult and narrow junction and in a very narrow lane were highlighted.

Planning appeal APP/Y3940/W/20/3244117 - Ganders Heath House Farm Lane Chapmanslade

Councillors reiterated the need to submit previous objections as they remained extant as the appeal did not offer any material changes.

Next meeting

The next Parish Council meeting would take place on 12th March in the Village Hall



Countryside Matters

By mid February we have had 20cms (8") rain since 1st January!

Storm Ciara brought chaos with high winds lashing rain day after day, followed by devastating Storm Dennis. With an already high water table, the brooks and streams were soon flowing into rivers that were hurrying to the sea, but with high spring tides meeting the rushing water coming down from mountains and high grounds, the water had to find its own level by spreading across towns and villages from Scotland to Wales and the South of England.

Homes and businesses were devastated, as are many hectares of countryside.

We might think we are suffering, but consider those whose businesses have been wrecked, homes spoilt and damage done to infrastructure, it will be years for some of this to be put right.

Anyone who has to work outside in this horrendous weather deserves a medal! Our postmen and women, refuse collectors, emergency teams and many others are helping to keep to some normality in this weather.

Farmers and their staff make every effort to keep their animals safe and well, but these are really challenging times with flood water ever increasing on pastureland where sheep and cattle graze. Safety for these animals is a priority, but higher and dryer land is not always readily available.

Sheep now in the process of lambing will not only have carried their unborn lambs, but the lovely warm coat of wool that they wear will have been wet and muddy for months,

weighing them down and using up energy that should go to produce healthy lambs and milk for the next few months.

Spring calving cattle although now in the shelter of farm buildings need more and more dry bedding (straw in most cases). Cattle facing the full elements outdoors are given fresh root crops and good silage in round feeders daily, but even our greensand soil on our highest ground is sodden.

Farmers and countrymen have always said we have to work with our weather patterns, but the concern of climate change is coming ever closer to our rural life.


