



Hedge hazards

Councillor Bill Parks explains the hazards of overgrown hedges and what you are obliged to do about yours

Don't let your hedge be a hazard

As we enter the autumn season and the annual flail cutting of roadside verges starts, I thought that I would write a few words about roadside hedges.

Travelling around the villages I see many examples of overgrown hedges alongside footpaths and country lanes. These pose a real hazard to people who are disabled or who are visually impaired and young children or other pedestrians who risk

injury or damage to their faces or clothing from thorns and branches. If the pavement (footway) is narrow or the obstruction is excessive, they may be forced into the road. This is particularly dangerous for wheelchair users or for people pushing a pram or buggy. On junctions and bends, overgrown hedges may obstruct sight lines and the clear view of motorists. They may also obscure traffic signs or streetlights and, with many of our country lanes being narrow, increase the risk of accidents.

Many hedges grow on the edge of the highway and mark its boundary with private property. It is the responsibility of the adjacent landowner or occupier to properly maintain them and any trees or other vegetation the hedge contains.

Landowners and occupiers are required by law to trim any hedge next to the public highway where the growth is preventing the

passage, or affecting the safety, of the highway user.

So please, check hedges on your land bordering the highway regularly and cut them back if they're obstructing visibility or the passage of vehicles or the lanes. Also

pedestrians along the lanes. Also check vegetation is not obscuring signs or streetlights.

If Wiltshire Council, exercising its powers as the Highway Authority, identify an obstructive hedge or potentially dangerous tree on your land, they can send a letter saying what work you need to carry out to make the vegetation safe as stated in The Highways Act 1980. If you don't deal with the obstruction, they may do the work and claim back the cost from you.

If trees, shrubs and hedges are regularly maintained to within your property boundary there will be no need for the Council to ask you to take action.

Around 150 oil heated properties across the UK from homes, pubs, schools to churches have been using the renewable liquid fuel Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil (HVO) for the past two years as part of our demonstration project. The switch from kerosene to HVO

required a minor modification Future to the boiler at an estimated cost of £500. As a result, Ready carbon emissions were reduced by 88%. Research shows there is more than enough sustainably sourced

supply to meet demand.

That's why renewable liquid fuels, with minimal up-front cost and disruption, are the ideal alternative solution. Our project is the perfect blueprint for more rural communities to follow as part of a wider rollout.

3. It's about fairness and choice. We're in a cost of living crisis but we still need to make progress in transitioning to greener heating. It's vital that renewable options are affordable and we believe YOU should have a choice over the type of renewable heating system you have in your home. It's sometimes hard to see how we, as individuals, can make a difference. That's why we created the Future Ready Fuel campaign to have a united voice. Every single letter sent to an MP makes a huge difference. Make your voice heard today!

Corsley wildflower meadow

Chris Johnson and Judith Selman write about the latest happenings at the meadow

The Corsley community wildflower meadow project has now been going for five years and we are pleased that Corsley Parish Council has granted another five years to continue developing this project.

Five years ago, this was the Corsley School playing field. It was a field of grass (and not much else) that had to be mown on a monthly basis to keep it tidy. Now the area is home to over 50 species of wildflowers and 12 different (non-commercial) grasses, not to mention the shrubs we have planted at the edges, such as guelder rose and hawthorn. We mow it twice a year: once with a standard mower in the spring, and once with a tractor-drawn drum mower at the end of August when the plants are tall. We owe grateful thanks to Adam Oakley for mowing each summer.

In previous years, we have had volunteers come to rake the mowings; but this year, we have had the mowings baled which saves a lot of labour. Thanks again to Adam for bringing along his small baler! We have had a couple of enquiries as to whether the bales could be used for horse feed. Unfortunately the hay was not dry enough to keep, despite a week of warm sunshine at the beginning of September. At this time of year, it is difficult to get the hay to dry out sufficiently because of heavy dew.

Some people might look at the meadow in summer and see only a mass of rampant growth. But those who look closely will see so much more. The wide variety of plants hosts

a diversity of other life. We have recorded 14 species of butterfly (including Brown Argus and Common Blue), 56 species of moth, 7 species of wild bees, 5 species of dragonflies (including Golden-Ringed and Southern Hawker) and damselflies, as well as many other invertebrates such as grasshoppers, beetles, hoverflies, shield bugs and so on. The flies provide food for birds such as swallows; the moths are food for bats. The berries on the shrubs are also food for birds. Voles live in the meadow which are food for owls and kestrels. None of this array of wildlife would be there if it were not for our meadow.

We are constantly working to increase the biodiversity of plants by sowing new species and planting plug plants in the meadow itself and on the bank. Normally it is estimated to take 15 years for a wildflower meadow to fully establish and we hope the village will continue to support it moving forwards.

You are free to come and visit the meadow anytime. Why not come next spring when the wildflowers are in bloom again. We will continue to mow paths around to make access easier. And don't forget, there is a picnic table which anyone can use. This is an amenity for all to enjoy.

Neil Carpenter, Chair, reports on recent goings on at the field

Well this has been an amazing growing year with rain, heat and sunshine. Rather than the field being brown and dry, as it was last year during the drought, the grass has been growing at such a rate that a once-a-week cut was not enough. Thank you to the team of volunteers who have helped keep the playing field looking great throughout the summer.

Some of you may have noticed that the Flying Carpet was been removed. We had a problem with some of the screws coming loose connecting the rubber to the frame. The company we bought it from came and collected it immediately and are sorting out a solution so it will not happen again. We are hoping to have it back and flying soon.

We wanted to say thank you to everyone who supported us at the Corsley Fayre by having a go at the skittles. We raised around £120 which will keep us in diesel for half of the next year.

Now that autumn has arrived can I please ask that any neighbours do not take it into their own hands to start cutting down hedges in the Playing Field without agreement. The Playing Field is a registered charity run by the trustees and therefore the trustees should be asked before anything is done on the field such as cutting down hedges or trees, dumping green waste onto the field or accessing the rear of houses.

We have also had a spate of thefts from the pavilion for the first time in some years. A number of grey chairs, a set of steps and a director's chair were taken along with squash, coke and straws. Clearly this is extremely frustrating for the trustees who work so hard to keep the Playing Field open for all, as well as now having to keep the pavilion locked all the time. We have changed the key safe so that it is impossible to work out the code. Replacing lost equipment and changing locks are all costs which reduce the amount we can spend on making the Playing Field as nice as possible for everyone in the village.

Over the next few weeks we will be preparing the field for winter. The badger fence will be put in place. This is to stop the badgers from digging up the outfield looking for bugs. It is very frustrating but we cannot tolerate the damage caused by them, which is then exacerbated by crows, causing significant expense and work for volunteers in the spring.

Finally, the Annual General Meeting will be on 15th November, hopefully at the Cross Keys. If there are any changes we will let everyone know via ours and the village FaceBook pages. Anyone wanting to support the Playing Field by being a trustee or just wanting to give feedback to the trustees is welcome to attend.

Corsley Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

John Willcox, Parish Clerk, rounds up the PC's activity in September

The Parish Council met on 4th September. The meeting proper was prefaced by a statement from the Chairman where he reminded councillors that the PC has a code of conduct and that it would be remiss if this was not adhered to. There followed a discussion on the use of social media when it comes to the airing of PC business and it was agreed that the PC Facebook page should be the vehicle for PC business in future.

Surprisingly, there were no planning applications to consider, albeit it was reported that the application by Malthouse Farm for a stable block and change of use to provide an all-weather area for equestrian use had been refused by the planning authority.

Streetscene

The three villages group are due to meet in the autumn to discuss any progress on the issues raised. In the meantime, the PC are engaging with officers of Wiltshire on a number of matters; brackets for the Speed Indicator Device at the western and eastern ends of the village on the A362, a pedestrian crossing on Corsley Heath and liaising with the Parish Steward on verges and hedges.

Villagers will have noticed that a lot of the road signs have been replaced as part of National Highway's maintenance programme. Following discussion and the circulation of a map detailing the points where permanent equestrian signs could be usefully placed, it was agreed that further dialogue with National Highways on the design and siting of further signs would be useful. In addition,

it was agreed that the PC should engage again with the Longleat Estate to try and mitigate the increasing traffic on the alternative entrances to Longleat.

Finance

A report had been circulated detailing the current financial position of the PC.

Detailed discussions regarding the precept for the financial year 2024/2025 will take place in November with a view to the precept being set in early January. The meeting discussed at a preliminary level the areas that might be included in these spending decisions. These included suggestions that the PC might take on, for a limited period, the cutting of hedges and verges in those lanes that the local authority are never going to do; replacement/ improvement of the of the two bus shelters at the White Hart and Longhedge; the implementation of the Emergency Plan that had been drafted. The financial implications of these suggestions will be further discussed and built into the budget.

The Wild Flower Meadow is part of the Old School Playing Field and its management is subject to a five-year review. It had been proposed that the agreement that governs the management should be extended for a further five years. This was agreed.

Baytree Close Development - Maud Davis Close

Villagers will be aware that the Baytree Close development has been in the pipeline for some time and may be wondering what has been

going on. After making contact with the local authority we can report the following:

The groundworkers are expected to be on site before the end of October, and it may be sooner. In terms of activity, the initial work will be to secure the site (and fence off the route of the path so that this is undisturbed), then the initial work will be the creation of the new road, followed by the drainage and footings for the houses. It is likely that the houses will be delivered to site early in the new year.

Regarding the acquisition of homes – six of the eight will be for affordable rent and will be let via Homes4Wiltshire. Anyone wishing to be considered for these needs to make sure they are registered as in housing need. Homes4Wiltshire will be advised when the homes are nearing completion and will then advertise them on their website for bids. Priority will be given to those with a local connection and with demonstrated housing need.

There are two, two-bedroom homes for shared ownership. These will be advertised via the PC, in local papers and on the website as completion is neared. These will also be prioritised for people with a local connection. Anyone interested in the shared ownership properties is advised to look at the website:

We understand that a lot of people have contacted the local authority about both tenures. At the point that advertising is done these people will be contacted via email and pointed towards the Homes4Wiltshire, or the Shared Ownership page on our website.

Anybody who has a specific circumstances or queries is welcome to contact Christine Brown, the Residential Development Project Manager at Christine.Brown@Wiltshire.gov.uk or on 01225 718771. Christine has indicated that she is happy to answer if she is able to.

Needless to say, as the PC becomes aware

of progress we will update the village.

Chapmanslade Parish Council

Parish Council Briefing

Councillor Phil Holihead reports on the PC's latest activities

The Chapmanslade PC met on Thursday 14th September.

Public forum

Councillor Bill Parks (Unitary Councillor) updated the meeting on Area Board activities and the recent tarmacing through the village.

One member of the public spoke regarding continued concerns related to the Thoulstone Park application and the number of public nuisance complaints the most recent event had generated.

The Thoulstone Park applicants spoke on the company's intentions with the present Licence permission application, the lessons learnt from the recent event particularly related to noise levels and changes made following the withdrawal of the previous application. Mention was also made regarding the positive comments from those who have attended events or presently access Thoulstone Park for various activities.

PC meeting

Updates were given on the recent road resurfacing and the small number of outstanding issues that were yet to be fixed, most of which had been noted by the contractor and were in the process of rectification. Councillor Adam Oakley thanked Councillor Bill Parks and Councillor Phil Holihead for enabling the smooth process during the road closure and for the continual communication with the workforce and updates for the residents.

The proposals regarding a small 'virtual' extension at the entrance to the village hall has been accepted by the Wiltshire Highways and Footpaths Group (LHFIG) and is awaiting a site visit by the Highways engineer.

Concern regarding the condition of pavements and the need to consider improvements to these soon were noted and would be taken up with LHFIG in due course. Councillor Bill Parks was already aware of the issue and was supportive of some upgrading.

The PC chose not to pursue any further a proposal to downgrade the High Street from an A road to B road as it met all the criteria for an A road and is also an emergency services route between two ambulance authorities. The PC felt that there was no evidence to support the proposal that changing back to a B road would either reduce the amount of traffic or traffic speeds going through the village.

Councillor Phil Holihead spoke on how the Police Traffic Enforcement team are looking at peaks of speed and working with data provided through Speed Watch Teams and SIDs. Chapmanslade will be joining the scheme which targets Police enforcement to speeding hot spots over 24 hour, 7 days a week period using SID data.

Licence application

Thoulstone Events License Application previous application withdrawn and a new application submitted.

In objecting to this application, the PC noted three particular concerns in addition to the clear evidence of historical and recent public nuisance issues from events at the site:

- It placed no limit on the number of events that can be held each year on this site
- It sought an extension for amplified music after 11 pm at weekends
- There is no clear requirement with regards to low frequency noise which has been a regular source of public nuisance.

Planning application P1/2023/06957 FULL

Proposed erection of new tennis Court and extension of existing car park at former Thoulstone Farm BA13 4AP

The PC objected to this application as follows:

- The existing car park is already extended to 16 spaces and not the 8 stated and is 3 times larger than shown on the application site plans. Adding a further 8 would make a total of 24 vehicles and this would make a mockery of the suggestion that there would be no uplift of usage at the site entrance.
- There is already an unauthorised car park on the west side of the property with no planning permission
- The proposed tree and hedge screening was for deciduous plants which will lose leaves in the autumn thereby providing no screening but adding to the possibility of creating a road hazard from wet leaves at the busy junction on the A36 which is in proximity.
- No archaeological survey was present regarding the ancient chapel shown on Ordnance Survey maps
- The PC felt that by applying for a land change from agricultural to residential amenity the applicant was opening the door for future development. The site is clearly a commercial enterprise of holiday lets as substantiated by the Hesdin Hall website.

Update on CIL funding proposals

Councillor Adam Oakley reported that there were lots of ideas being put forward and projects need to be more formalised, and costings included before being presented to the PC. Some of those he mentioned were related to the church developments as a community building, a second-hand mower for the Memorial Playing Field and the PC's 25% commitment to the topographical survey of the High Street. He asked the PC to consider managing and negotiating further re the multi-user pathway proposals and it was agreed that a meeting for councillors to discuss ways forward with managing this process would be arranged outside of the PC meeting.

Update on 106 Funding

Councillor Humphreys reported on the process for Wiltshire Council in dealing with its legal responsibility and requirements. It is a lengthy and complex process and it may be some time before and money it is released to the PC.

New PC member

Councillor Ian Curtis was welcomed to his first meeting as a co-opted member of the council.

Following receipt of an application to fill the final co-option vacancy on the council, councillors voted to co-opt Professor Adrian Evans.

Next meeting

The next Council meeting is planned for the 12th October 2023.

Corsley WI

September news



Members began the meeting by remembering Jean White, a member of Corsley WI for over fifty years, who passed away during the summer and who will be greatly missed by all who knew her.

Several visitors joined us as we then went 'beneath the covers of a bookshop' with Tina Gaisford-Waller, the manager of Hunting Raven Books in Frome. She came to this, her dream job, after working in other areas; as an actor, as a stunt woman and in hospitals. She tried lots of things but a constant thread in her life was her love of books.

In 2018, Tina became the manager of Hunting Raven Books and shortly after entered a competition launched by Pan Macmillan to mark their 175th anniversary. She proposed a project, 'Books Against Loneliness', and was successful in winning funding. Working with local organisations, including Active and in Touch and Mendip Health Connections, Hunting Raven began to hold friendly 'one to ones' with people to chat over coffee and cake about what is important to them. As a result of the conversations staff would choose a book which they thought their guest would enjoy and hand write a letter explaining the choice before gift wrapping it and delivering it to them.

This was followed by 'Meet by the Books', an initiative aimed at younger adults who were asked to bring a book they loved or hated, that they felt strongly about and talk about it to others. The idea was to promote new conversations that didn't revolve around personal details.

These projects helped to raise awareness of the part books can play in combatting feelings of loneliness and demonstrated the role that independent bookshops like Hunting Raven play in the community.

Once a month Tina meets with a sales rep from each of the major publishers to go through the lists of what is coming in the next 2-3 months. They have a good understanding what is needed, and Tina has a good sense of the books people like to buy.

Tina went on to talk about the process of publishing a book. From a manuscript being accepted to a proof copy being printed can take anything from two months up to a year. Writers need a good relationship with their publisher when it comes to editing a book, some books require little editing, others more. Proof copies are sent to reviewers and booksellers well in advance of publication.

Hunting Raven Books has a 'Proof Pudding Book Club,' giving a chance to read and discuss proof copies of books not yet published. They have also just hosted 'The Accidental Book Festival', with visits from authors throughout September. The next author event, at the end of October, will feature Ellie Griffiths. There is certainly a lot going on beneath the covers of this bookshop!



Wonderful Walks



Before the weather gets 'proper cold', as they say in Zummerzet, let's explore a favourite walk of mine, at Bath. If you're using a car, use Odd Down Park and Ride as well, saving yourself Bath parking charges. Disembark at Southgate Street and walk round to where the bus station is. Past that and the railway station are old underpasses left (they look like tunnels), but one of these is a road through to a green-painted metal bridge. This is Halfpenny Bridge, the replacement for a wooden toll bridge which collapsed into the Avon, taking people with it. This bridge is free to use, so cross it; the toll house is still there at your right. Turn left next and walk past Widcombe Baptist Church, with its bold message: Christ died for our sins.

You're on the canal towpath now and near your first lock, the 'Widcombe' or 'Bottom'

lock, beside Thimble Mill pumping station. This pumped water up from the Avon to the canal, replacing liquid lost each time the locks were opened. The road you cross, next, is Rossiters Road, built in 1976; it meant merging locks 8 and 9, creating the seconddeepest lock in England, nearly 20 feet deep. The ground rises as you head for the next lock, 'Wash House', so-named because a nearby building was where Bath's Georgian and Victorian washerwomen dealt with laundry for the city's wealthy visitors. There's a white-painted iron footbridge across the canal here.

Past Abbey lock, next, there are great views of Bath, plus the Pumphouse Chimney. The pumphouse has gone, but the chimney remains, ornate in style because Bathwick Hill residents didn't want an industrial chimney

ruining their views in the 1840s! Near here, too, is the Millenium Sundial, detailing on

its 'arm', the workers employed to run the canal and transport goods on it. Top Lock Cottage was, first, a lock-keeper's home with a barter store for trading goods between boatmen. Later, it became a Bath Humane Society station, where equipment was kept for rescuing those who fell in the canal.



classic Georgian/Victorian structure built on its bridge for the Duke of Cumberland, as the Kennet and Avon Canal offices. Here's one of the first designated office buildings in Europe, not just England! Canal tolls were paid at the bridge, using the tin and pipe technique – do you remember that?! You paid your money, it went in a tin can with your bill and was airlifted through the pipe to an office. The cash was removed, the bill marked paid and back the can came with the paperwork and any change due!


Pump house chimne We've almost reached Sydney Gardens, the farthest point today, but don't let that stop you exploring further. Park at or near Sydney Gardens another time, join the canal towpath there, turn left

Bairds Maltings is on the far side of the canal; this was once a malt house, as seen from the distinctive conical chimney. The wide steps down to the water were used by men carrying grain for malting here; the finished product was later returned to boats for transport elsewhere.

Millenium sundial

Sydney Wharf is reminiscent of the canal in its heyday. Coal from the Somersetshire Coal Canal was offloaded here, along with heavy farm goods, timber, stone and slate. The elegant Bath stone building beside the wharf may once have been an hotel, with its apsidal frontage. Cleveland House, further on, is a





They also had to be built by Stothert, a Bath company, and the iron had to come from their foundry at Coalbrookdale.

Before today's exit into Sydney Gardens, you'll see an attractive footpath exit on the left, with a white-painted iron barrier, resembling (to me!) a swan reaching out of the water and stretching its wings! Exit left, instead, at the wide stone bridge further on and walk through the gardens to the Holburne Museum. Stand at the front of the building and ahead of you is Great Pulteney Street, a straight wide thoroughfare. It may be half a mile long, before you reach Pulteney Bridge and find the way off that, left, down to Pulteney Weir. From there, find the city centre and treat yourself to lunch at the Pump Rooms, before returning to your car...

- Power tools: hand and bench drills, sander, planer, jigsaw, circular, band and chop saws, lathe, cultivator, rotavator, welding machine and generator
- Sewing machines: manual, electric, treadle and industrial
- · Knitting machines: machine and hand wool, needles and patterns
- · Haberdashery: needles, cottons, large material pieces/rolls, buttons, zips, tapes
- Fully working IT equipment: desktop computers and laptops running a minimum of Microsoft Windows 7, modern flatscreen monitors, tablets.

Power tools can be either electric or battery (only lithium batteries can be sent abroad).

- Broken tools we can sharpen and remove surface rust, but can't repair or take tools with woodworm.
- Ladders and step ladders
- Lawn rakes/long-handled shears, hedge trimmers, electric strimmers, Workmate benches
- · Electric and hand lawnmowers
- Printers, scanners, typewriters
- · Disability aids: walking frames, wheelchairs, medicines and glasses
- · Clothes and shoes.

Success story

• I learnt knitting here last year and graduated in June. My husband does piecework (day labouring), which is very hard, pays very little and is not regular. We could not afford our own home and lived with my nieces, siblings, brotherin-law and parents. I have one daughter and I could not afford to send her to school. Before my training I had no skills and could do nothing; life was so difficult ??

Nelly shows us the impact skills training and access to knitting machines can have on one family. Her husband can now take days off to recover from hard labour, which will prolong his life, and not feel under pressure to accept the worst jobs.

Nelly no longer needs to fear the family will go hungry or whether her extended family will ask them to leave their home because they cannot afford to support them. Three months of training and access to tool have given Nelly and her family a secure long-term future.

Dear TWAM,

The machines and tools for carpentry we have been given from Bishop Francis and the New Life Giving Ministries, Lusaka, has benefitted the Masansa community by creating sustainable jobs for ten residents. Because of this, the children and dependents of the 10 employees can now go to school. On average, each worker has six family members, which gives an approximate number of 60 children now going to school.

The machines have helped our production centre improve on the quality of products and contributed to job creation in the Masansa community of Mkushi central province. Having the tools and machines also motivates workers to work well and faster compared to when they did not have them. The tools make our work easier and faster.

We are so grateful to TWAM for this generosity. May God continue using you.



A view from over the hedge...

Countryside Matters

I understand many readers of The Bridge hope to find the rainfall for the month in my regular ramblings! Not to disappoint:

August 2023 87.22 ml August 2022 33.00 Total to date 686.89ml (2022)356.00ml).

By the time the children returned to school we returned to a heatwave with temperatures reaching 30°C in early September

Fortunately, the Corsley Fayre enjoyed good weather and a most successful and enjoyable day culminating in a wonderful evening of country dancing raising much needed money for the radiotherapy team at RUH Bath. Sadly, the Frome Agricultural & Cheese Show suffered from the extreme heat with the dog and cattle classes being cancelled and many attendees leaving early.

By mid September we were battening everything down as rain and high winds came in from the west.

As the nights draw in we start to think of autumn and the changes that come about in the countryside. Leaves start to change colour, grass stops growing, fruit on trees and hedges are now showing their colour ready to attract the birds that will be flying in from colder climes.

Work on the farm now entails preparing the buildings ready for housing the cattle, first at night-time and then, as the need arises, for housing 24 hours a day.

Autumn fieldwork continues throughout October when the soil temperature is warm enough for germination of grass and cereal seeds. Maize is harvested when the cobs are 30/35 percent dry matter.

A high percentage of calves are born in the autumn months so that milk is produced through the winter months. It is important that the cows' diet is correct to maintain a regular supply of their milk. This is when good home-produced feed is so important, as commodities such as soya and vitamins, are so expensive.

Calves are housed either in pens in large airy barns or covered pens, with around eight to each pen. They have individual care from day one from their regular calf-rearer (usually a female worker) who sees to feeding, bedding, water, medical needs and air circulation. Heat stress in calf houses can encourage many diseases.

For early spring lambs, both the ewes and rams must be in good condition during the autumn so that conception is good. Special supplement blocks will be placed in the fresh grazing fields.

Dogs fouling in fields can adversely affect the health of grazing animals, so if you are walking your dog on a public footpath, please ensure you pick it up and take it home and dispose of it sensibly.

You may be aware that young pheasants and partridge poults are now in their pens in our woodlands; please keep well away as they are easily scared and will crowd together for safety, potentially resulting in smothering some of the poults close to the wire fence.

Enjoy the woodland for the colours they offer us and, when the frosts come, enjoy the rustle of the leaves under your feet!

Updates about the hall

We have received a draft contract with a generous offer from Longleat to rent some of the adjacent land. However, the proposed contract has raised some potential issues which may require changes to our charity constitution. We are consulting with a specialist legal firm to advise us about any changes required and the implications and costs thereof before we take a final decision.

Funding

We are asking the Parish Council to consider making a larger commitment to the funding of the hall from the precept in future. Village halls are at the heart of what makes a village, whether you personally use it today, in the past or in the future; it is a village facility which,

if lost, would be very hard or impossible to replace.

The ever-increasing fixed costs are significant and include insurance, licences, water, daily electric charges, grounds maintenance, required electric/fire checks, basic cleaning and more. We are currently making up the shortfall on hirings income from reserves, and this is not sustainable in the long term. We need to make a surplus to fund other maintenance and improvements along with acquiring grants whenever possible. Having the fixed costs covered would give the

hall that security.


